The Year 11 and 12 students who made up the audience were very interested in hearing about not only the achievements of the award recipients, but about where the achievements led them.

Across the group we had students going to universities in Queensland, NSW and Victoria, as well as other interesting destinations. It made the results of hard work very real, and a couple of our current students commented afterwards that they found the assembly 'inspiring'.

Deputy's Report

It has been a fantastic start to the year with many new faces within the student and staff of the school. All bring some wonderful experiences and stories from their previous location. They enrich our school and I am sure will make great contributions in the time shared with us over the coming years.

Year 7 settled in quickly to the routine of such a big school. I have been impressed with the uniform, the great use of manners and the respect shown to others. Several students have made a point of coming up to me for a chat about many things especially the excitement of being at Singleton High School and the opportunities here. I am looking forward to sharing the journey of their learning.

Year 11 are actively engaged in their studies with some subject changes occurring. The reality of Year 11 being only three terms – 31 weeks, is putting our seniors on a fast track and most are taking up and meeting the challenge. The assessments commence around week 4 across the varied areas of study. Our students are taught in a variety of ways - through classes here at school, Trade Training, TAFE, Industry Based learning, work placement, Distance Education, video conferencing and School Based Apprenticeships/Traineeships. The method of delivery can be a varied combination of those above, all suited to aspirations and needs of the student. Gladly, these opportunities exist for our students and not the very limited approach of my time, way back in the last century.

The HSC 2014 Excellence Assembly occurred on Tuesday 3 February. This assembly is to recognise those students who gained exceptional results in individual subjects or have been highly consistent across all their studies. It was an assembly that also showed our current Years 11 and 12 that consistent effort gains great rewards and that no one pattern of study is preferable when seeking results. In particular this was noted when the subjects studied by the 16 recipients were read out along with the path chosen for careers. Our new Principal Mrs Gray was the guest speaker. Information about Anaphylaxis

What is anaphylaxis?

Anaphylaxis is a severe and sometimes sudden allergic reaction. It can occur when a susceptible person is exposed to an allergen, such as a food or insect sting. Although death is rare, an anaphylactic reaction always requires an emergency response. Prompt treatment with adrenaline is required to halt progression and can be lifesaving. Fortunately anaphylactic reactions are usually preventable by implementing strategies for avoiding allergens.

Staff training and awareness

SHS staff are currently undertaking a 3hour online Anaphylaxis training course. This will be followed up with face to face training delivered by our Community Health Nurse, Libby Gresham on March 18 2015. While the main role of the school is to provide education, we want your child to be relaxed, safe and happy at school and for you to feel confident that your child is being well looked after.

Parent/Caregiver Responsibility

It is important that parents notify the school if their child has an allergy and is at risk of anaphylaxis. This notification should occur either at the time of enrolment, or if the student is already enrolled, as soon after diagnosis as possible. So that the support provided by the school is effective it is important that a partnership is established between the parent and the school to share information and clarify expectations.


It is the role of the parent/caregiver to:

- Provide an ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis completed and signed by the doctor. A new plan is completed by the doctor each time an adrenaline autoinjector is prescribed. It is important that parents provide the school with a copy of the updated plan, or a photocopy of that plan
- Provide the equipment and consumables for carrying out health care support as specified in the student's individual health care plan, including where relevant, the appropriate adrenaline autoinjector
- Replace the adrenaline autoinjector in a timely manner before it expires or after it has been used
- Reinforce relevant aspects of the individual health care plan with their child, where
 practicable, for example if their child comes into contact with an allergen at school they
 must immediately inform a teacher and, if age appropriate, remind the child of the
 importance of taking their adrenaline autoinjector to school with them

Important

Your doctor will need to provide information about the nature of the allergy and appropriate emergency treatment, including an ASCIA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis so we can develop the individual health care plan. You will also need to provide the appropriately labelled autoinjector to the school (e.g. EpiPen®, Anapen®)



Chocolate. Definitely chocolate.


What is the best thing about SHS?

Welcome all to 2015 at Singleton High School

To students and parents / caregivers that are returning this year welcome back and to all of our new students and parents / caregivers welcome to Singleton High School.

The Ka-Wul Centre resides in the Singleton High School grounds and is a resource for ALL students, teachers and the community. With the centre in the school grounds it is a positive environment for students to learn and socialise.

Since the centre has been open it has become one of the popular places where Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students socialise. The centre is based around respect and pride of who you are and where you come from.

The Ka-Wul Centre has a special atmosphere that everyone feels. It's a place of culture and learning. This proactive and positive vibe within the centre is the way that enables all who enter to learn and become friends. The centre provides resources, reference books, DVDs and computers as well as many Cultural artefacts available for students to view and study. The Ka Wul centre is a friendly place for students and teachers to chill out in the recess and lunch breaks or to get help with assignments and assessments. Singleton High School employs a number of qualified Norta Norta Teacher Tutors to assist students with every aspect of their education at Singleton High School.

The Ka-Wul centre also offers a Homework Program where a qualified teacher are available to provide assistance to students in all subject areas. This program is run at the Ka-Wul Centre from 3.30pm to 5.00pm every Tuesday and Thursday from the 24 February 2015.

Michael Heitmeyer is a proud Aboriginal man descending from the Kooma people of Southern Queensland and is a member of Awabakal Local Aboriginal Land Council. He has worked in the welfare field for most of his working life performing a variety of roles as an Aboriginal case worker/youth worker. He has worked with various Aboriginal communities ranging from New South Wales to Northern Territory and most recently at Yulara in Northern Territory. He worked as a cultural activity presenter and tour guide. Whilst there he had the privilege of learning and engaging with the Mutitjulu Aboriginal Community. He continued his relationship with them by undertaking learning within their country. Michael's mentor here is Uncle Peter Williams.

Over many years Michael has been a member of Aboriginal dance groups and recently through his work at Kup-Poon-Dee he had established and led a dance group of children/young people. This dance group was called Gooroomul Murrooma (Gathang language) and he performed at The Australian Aboriginal and Islander Dance Symposium at The Australian National University in front of elders and community members from every state and territory. This was a highlight for him and for the young people involved in this group as following the performance elders and community members sat down with us and shared their stories and dancing.

Michael has been involved in conducting class excursions to Aboriginal sites, sharing with them what he could about each site, as well as conducting smoking ceremonies to ensure everything was in order, representing his people and culture, something not to be taken lightly.

We would also like to thank Coal & Allied for their funding for this program.

Vocational Education and Training Year in Review



VET Faculty - Vocational Education and Training

The VET Faculty in 2014 has been highly productive with students from Years 10, 11 and 12 developing their knowledge and practical skills in their chosen course of study. In 2015, hospitality students will be catering for the Coal Festival in March 2015; and Frank Faulkner, a former Singleton High School student and now head chef at Muse Restaurant, will be delivering culinary demonstrations to our students. Thank you to Hunter Culinary Chefs Association who, over the year opened up many avenues for staff training and professional development and many opportunities for students.








THAI CHICKEN SALAD





- 2 boneless chicken breasts OR 4-8 skinless. chicken thighs, cut into thick strips
- Large bowl of salad greens (enough for 2-3) people)
- Handful fresh mint (about 8-10 leaves)
- · Handfuls of fresh coriander/cilantro and basil



Sweet chili sauce

Cloves garlic, minced

Fish sauce

Soy sauce

Fresh-squeezed lime juice (or substitute lemon juice)

DRESSING:

- Juice of 1 lime
- 4 Tbsp. fish sauce
- •2 Tbsp. brown sugar
- •2 cloves garlic, minced
- •1/2 tsp cayenne pepper OR dried crushed chili


Preparation:

1. Stir together the marinade and pour over the chicken strips. Toss to coat, then set in the refrigerator to marinate while you prepare the salad fixings and warm up your grill.


- 2. Stir the salad dressing ingredients together in a cup. Taste-test the dressing, looking for a tangy taste that is a balance between sweet and sour, salty and spicy (it should have some kick to it from the cayenne/chili). Add a little
- 3. Prepare your bowl of salad greens. For the mint, stack the leaves on top of each other, then thinly slice into slivers and toss in with the salad. Also add some fresh basil and coriander if you have it (optional).
- 4. Before grilling, lightly brush grill with a little vegetable oil. Grill your marinated chicken, basting it with the left-over marinate the first time you turn it. For oven-broiling, place chicken strips on a broiler pan (or on a foilcovered cookie sheet, turning up foil at the edges to prevent spilling). Set oven to broil setting and place chicken on one of the upper racks, turning it every 3-5 minutes, or until well done.

5. When ready to eat, toss the salad with the dressing and serve the cooked chicken strips overtop. If desired, reserve a little dressing to drizzle over the chicken too. Garnish with a few extra mint leaves and thinly sliced red chili (if you're not afraid of spice). Pair this dish with a cold white wine or lager, and enjoy!
